The bride entered the church on the arm of her brother (Mr Godfrey Marshall, of Cooma), who gave her away. The bride was magnificently attired in a rich ivory satin duchesse, embroidered with pearl applique. The bodice was of tucked mouseline de soie, over ivory satin, with an exquisite pearl yoke. the under-dress being of beautiful old lace. Her veil of tulle was arranged over a wreath of orange blossom. Her jewels included a diamond bangle and pearl brooch, gifts of the bridegroom.

The bouquet was of white tuber roses, gardenias, orange blossom, with maiden hair and asparagus fern, tied with white satin ribbon. The bridesmaids wero Misses Florence and Adelaide, sisters of the bride. They wore both gowned in white silk, daintily tucked and profusely trimmed with lace. The bodices had belts of satin ribbon confining their blousy fullness, transparent yokes and sleeves of lace ; hats of white felt, trimmed with chiffon, pale green ribbon and seagulls. The bridegroom's gifts to them were a necklet and star pendant of pearls; also the bouquets they carried, of red carnations, autumn leaves and asparagus fern tied with broad streamers of pale green ribbon. The bride was also attended by Valerie Marshall, her niece, a charming little girl of six summers, who was daintily attired in white, soft silk, picture hat of cream velvet and chiffon strings. She carried a basket of red roses and autumn leaves, and wore a gold bangle, the gift of the bridegroom. Mr Arthur Davison, of Illawong station, supported the bridegroom.

The church was crowded, as also the approaches thereto. Messrs. Nixon, the sons of the venerable bridegroom, being amongst the wedding party; whilst the youthful bride, elegantly attired, was pronounced by her gazing feminine critics to be extremely pretty, wearing as she did an impressive air of resignation.

In the evening, the happy couple repaired by mail train to Sydney for the purposes of spending the honeymoon.

The bride was richly attired in a cream satin brochure dress, which was tastefully ornamented with orange blossoms and rich Parisian lace. The bridesmaids were eight in number. The Misses Wood wore white silk and blue satin dresses, and Miss E. Byrne and Miss E. Mumford looked exceedingly pretty in pink nun's veiling and satin dresses. Four other young ladies, whose names we didn't ascertain, were dressed in pale blue, and what is termed "crushed strawberry". The whole of the dresses were made by the Misses Warr, of Gurwood Street, who are deserving of the highest praise for their very handsome work.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the wedding party filed out of the church, and drove to Mr. Walsh's residence in Newtown, where dinner was served. A large number of friends of the family were present, and before dispersing many were the wishes expressed for many happy returns of the day.

Mr Wilkinson is well known to many Wagga residents, having resided here for some years before accepting his present appointment. The bride's father was one of the pioneer settlers of the Murrumbidgee, and during his lifetime was one of the leading spirits of this town and district.

The marriage was solemnised by the Rev. J.C. McDonald, M.A., of St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Wagga. A large number of relatives and friends of the bride and bridegroom, from both Sydney and Melbourne were present, with a number of friends from Wagga and surrounding district.

About forty-five persons sat down to the wedding breakfast. A dance followed in the evening, at which a number of additional friends from Wagga were present.

There were eight bridesmaids, being seven sisters of the bride and a niece of the bridegroom. The bride's dress was of cream satin, trimmed with lace and pearls, and the bridesmaids were attired in white Indian silk, trimmed with lace.

The bridal presents were numerous and the choice in design and variety. Notwithstanding the wet weather, everything passed off merrily.

The homestead of North Junee Station was the scene of a very happy ceremony on Tuesday morning last, when Miss Bridget Ann Donnelly, the eldest daughter of Mrs J.J. Donnelly, the popular and respected hostess of the North Junee Station, was married to Mr Mervyn Marmaduke Crawley, eldest son of Mr C. W. Crawley, the well-known freeholder, of Junee.

The ceremony was fixed for 11 o'clock, and precisely at that hour the bride, attended by her bridesmaids, entered the spacious room which had been temporarily fitted up for the celebration of the Nuptial Mass, leaning on the arm of her uncle, Mr P.J. Donnelly, of Bywong, Gundagai, by whom she was given away. The bridegroom being accompanied by Mr James Mackins, Crown Lands Agent at Corowa, as his best man.

The bride was dressed in white ivory satin trimmed with Chantilly lace, with wreath of orange blossoms, and a veil of richly embroidered tulle. The travelling dress was an exquisite goblin-blue cashmere trimmed with broche silk, and tulle bonnet en-suite.

The bride's travelling dress consisted of grey check, and a grey and pink bonnet. They left by express for Melbourne and Bathurst, where the honeymoon is to be spent.

Markt, of Wagga, who was also a guest for the day, and as buggies were in waiting, the company were driven to the residence of Mr Morgan. Here the wedding party were photographed by an amateur photographer, in the person of the head groomsman (Mr William McLean), after which an adjournment was made to the adjacent concert hall, where a sumptuous and tastefully arranged breakfast had been prepared, the catering being in the hands of Mrs Roulston.

Shortly after the conclusion of the breakfast, at which the customary toasts were drunk, the bride and bridegroom, amid showers of rice and slippers, took their departure by train, en route for Moss Vale and Shoalhaven, at which last named place the happy pair propose spending their honeymoon, prior to returning to Wagga, where they intend residing.
